I would like to donate in his honor to the Veterans and Children's foundation that was stated earlier. This will ensure that his name gets added to a plaque at National Headquarters. To make this happen the family has asked that

donations be made to The American Legion. I want to make sure that we respect their wishes. If we meet our goal, and are awarded anything by National, I will personally deliver it to his family. I think this will be the perfect way to honor IPDC Clark for everything that he has done as a member of our department.

Another item that I would like to discuss is the issues we have with phishing emails. Recently, we were victim to a lot of emails pretending to be me asking members to purchase gift cards. 





DISTRICT AND POST NEWS





Our Jackson Hole American Legion Post 43 has been very busy since the last issue of the Legionnaire was distributed. Our monthly meetings have continued at our historic Post Building and on Zoom, and we have continued to have featured speakers at each meeting. In October, our Post was pleased to celebrate the 102nd anniversary of its charter, making us one of the oldest American Legion Posts in the country.

Post Membership: Our membership currently stands at 133, including 112 paid up members for 2023, and we hope to reach our state goal of 129 members in the next few months. Several new members have joined our Post this summer, including one Korean War veteran who recently turned 98 years old. We also were able to celebrate the 105th birthday in October of our member, Fred Miles, who is one of the oldest living American Legion members in the country. Fred was a pilot in WWII in the Army Air Corps, and he flew for the U.S. Air Force in Korea. He was the recipient of numerous awards and decorations during his 27 years of service, including the Distinguished Flying Cross, and he was one of the instructors of the famous Tuskegee Airmen. Our Post also currently has 24 members in our SAL Squadron who are all welcomed at Post meetings and functions. We hope to recruit many more new SAL Squadron members during the coming year.

Scholarship Awards: Our Post participated again in the annual Old Bill's fundraiser in Jackson, and we received more than 40 donations and a large matching amount that primarily will be used for awarding our annual scholarships to graduating Jackson Hole area high school students for use toward continuing education.

Repair and Renovation of Post Building: During the summer months, our Post building underwent significant work to repair several important areas needing maintenance. These included replacement and painting of the outside walkway and deck timbers, new fascia surrounding the entire building, repairs to external storm window frames, and removal of an old unneeded chimney. The entire building was also washed and re-stained, and additional insulation was added. Additional minor repairs were made to our Post's 50 year old roof. This work has put our building in excellent condition going forward.

Honor Guard Ceremonies: Our Post conducted an Honor Guard service for Army veteran Earl Lutz in August. The ceremony took place outside the Lutz home beside the Snake River, where a large tent had been provided for the many friends and family who came to honor Earl's life. Following our rifle salute and the playing of Taps by a family friend, Post members folded the American Flag and presented it to Earl's widow with the thanks of a grateful nation for his service. Two more similar Honor Guard ceremonies were held on the same afternoon in October at the Aspen Hill Cemetery in Jackson. These were to honor the burials of two different U.S. Navy veterans.

Reopening of Post 43 Kitchen and Bar for Lunch: After a long period of closure due to Covid, our Post reopened in August for lunch on Thursdays and Fridays from 1100-1400. This has provided a great place for members and guests to socialize and enjoy some good food and drinks, and to play some pool. In conjunction with the Elks Club, the Post recently welcomed three different groups of combat veterans at the Post lunches from the "Honoring Our Veterans" organization, and those who attended were very appreciative and enthusiastic about the food and the chance to relax and join conversation with our members and other guests. We also had the pleasure of welcoming one of our oldest members, Harry Baxter, along with his wife and son, to the Post for lunch in September. Harry has been a Legion member for 67 years.

Ceremony at Grand Teton Park Visi-

tors' Center: On Friday, August 5, our Post provided a flag detail at the Grand Teton Park Visitors Center for a special session of the U.S. District Court for Wyoming, where U.S. Magistrate Judge Rankin swore in and welcomed over 20 new U.S. citizens from several different countries. New inductees included people from Russia, Ukraine, Mexico, Canada, Jamaica, and several other countries. The program included our presentation of the colors, singing of the National Anthem, introduction of each of the new citizens, remarks by the Judge on the meaning of U.S. citizenship, and comments from the deputy Superintendent of Grand Teton National Park, whose family had immigrated to the U.S. from India when he was an infant. Each new citizen then swore allegiance to the United States, and each received a certificate from the Judge attesting to their acceptance of the obligations of citizenship. Judge Rankin then invited the new citizens to give personal remarks of their own choosing, and several people came forward to do so. Finally, the Judge invited all the children in the large audience to the stage to join everyone in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag. This was a very moving and emotional ceremony for everyone involved

Presentation by Jason Anderson: At the Post meeting in August, our Post member, Jason Anderson, gave us a presentation on his organization PreVeteran, and what they are doing to assist veterans and active duty service members in preparing for and transitioning to life after the service. Jason is a native of Jackson, who attended the U.S. Air Force Academy, and returned home after many years serving in the Air Force and in other government and civilian employment. He described both a 501(c)(3) Foundation that has been formed recently, as well as a for-profit entity that both provide various educational, training and other help to support service members to get a good start in the civilian world.

Presentation by Robert Gill: Robert Gill, grandson of two of our founding Post members, and the son of Ralph Gill, also a former Post member, spoke to us at our meeting in September about his life growing up in Jackson. He briefly described his family's history in Jackson, and how they came to run the Jackson Hole Hereford Ranch. His descriptions of the early layout of the town, and the subsequent changes to the downtown area brought out many questions from the members. Robert also discussed some of the interesting facts related to the formation of the Grand Teton National Park, and he told us stories of his father's write in victories as town mayor. He also brought with him many photos of the town from the early days, when the downtown was totally different from today. Commander Burke sincerely thanked Robert for sharing his great memories of our town, and Post Adjutant, Dave Hill presented Robert with a gift of a membership as a new SAL Squadron 43 member.

Veterans Day Plans: On Veterans Day, November 11, our Post will take part in the traditional ceremony on the Jackson Town Square to honor all our veterans. The Jackson High School is planning to bring 900 students to the ceremony, including the school chorus, who will sing patriotic songs prior to the start of the event. Our Post will present the colors, provide a rifle salute and the playing of Taps, and our Post member and Commander of the local VFW Post, Ed Leibzeit, will provide comments to the assembled audience. The ceremony will be followed by an 11.11 miles Ruck march for all interested people. The participants can carry donations of nonperishable foodstuffs that will be collected at our Post both before and after the ceremony for transfer to local charities.

District 3 George W. Vroman Post #2 Casper

In 2015 George W. Vroman Post 2 decided to participate in the Wyoming Vietnam Welcome Home Reunion along with the other organizations in Casper.

We purchased 130 flags and placed 123 flags at the Veterans Cemetery one for each Wyoming loss in Viet-Nam.

After the reunion we at the Post decided that we would use the flags to decorate Veterans Park on holidays and also the Veterans Cemetery with Thank All Veterans past and present and then we added a picture of our Wyoming Fallen Veterans memorial just erected in Casper to honor every Wyoming Veterans that was lost in Combat.

The Wyoming Fallen Veterans Memorial will display the names of every combat loss that was born in Wyoming or joined the service while living in Wyoming.

We started with the Spanish American War once Wyoming became a one that was more visible and easier to access. The City donated the land at 3800 West 13th Street the location of Patterson - Zonta Park.

American Legion went to work trying to raise the funds needed in 2021 and started asking local business's for financial, material and skilled labor support.

The Post sent out numerous applications for Grants and fortunately the AARP - Community Challenge Grant was the only one to be accepted.



ated and we asked all the Veterans organizations what they thought should be incorporated into the creation of the new memorial.

It was determined that it needed to be highly visible to honor those that are on the walls, accessible to young, old and disabled, easily readable, included every veteran that died in Combat that was a Wyoming native or was a citizen of Wyoming when he died

50 flags each Memorial Day.

Since then, we have joined with Dean Morgan middle school students by placing flags around the school for their Veterans Appreciation program each Veterans Day. We also place flags at Casper Veterans Park and the Mills Memorial Park. Now the new Wyoming Fallen Veterans Memorial will be added to the list.

The Post was working to purchase a box trailer to store all our flags and tools we need to install the flags.It would also make it easier to put them out and advertise The Casper Legion at the same time.

One of our members made a magnanimous donation of a box trailer for us to use as our flag trailer.

We converted the inside to safely store all our flags, banners and utilities and has made life a lot easier.

We then formed a committee to design the trailer and after we picked out a design we consulted with Tim Carey with ProFilms vinyl wrapping for a final design. We wanted the nose of the trailer to be a Bald Eagle with each military branch leading the way. We incorporated the new suicide prevention logo since we truly believe that this issue needs more awareness.

On the back we made sure to

State and included every war we lost someone in up to the last wars on terrorism in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Post 2 Commander Dean Welch had been asked several times back in 2016 why we didn't move the memorial on the river to some place more accessible since where it is now is difficult for disabled to get to and few people even know it is there so the Post decided to look into it. Since the Legion Post didn't own the memorial some research had to be done.

The river memorial was the original idea of Marine Corps Reserve member Leo Sanchez, Leo was a teacher and a Korean War Veteran and established the memorial in 2013.

After Leo passed away then the memorial became the responsibility of the City of Casper. The Post contacted the City about moving the memorial to a more visible location. They weren't aware of the memorial as many others didn't know it was there due to it's hidden location. The City agreed to the move but after some inspection of the panels it was determined that it would be to destructive to the memorial to move it.

After some discussion the City and the Legion Post decided to leave the existing memorial and build a new





Veterans Day Ceremony held at Post 6, Cheyenne

Veterans Day is celebrated all over the United States, and especially here in Wyoming, where we are rich with military history. This Veterans Day Francis E. Self American Legion Post 6 held a Veterans Day ceremony with guest speaker Col. John F. Hundley, vice commander of the 90th Missile Wing at F.E. Warren Air Force Base, along with U.S.Senator Cynthia Lummis - R-Wyo.

Post 6 Past Commander DJ Johnson was the emcee for the ceremony, and first up to speak was Post Commander William (Bill) Barnes. "Veterans never stop serving, even though they have hung up their uniform it truly is a lifelong commitment, it is a deep sacrifice through their hearts and souls in the volunteering to serve in the U.S military service." He spoke about the diverse group of men and women from every ethnic, economic and religious backgrounds. "They come from every state and territory, and are bound by one commitment - to defend the United States of America with their life, if called upon." He said. Barnes went on to explain that military service is not for the faint of heart, possibly risking life and limb, whereas in civilian life that is not the case.

He touched on the subject of Veterans and homelessness, which is becoming a very common problem across America. Barnes stated that currently there approximately 60,000 homeless Veterans. "Sad when Veterans make up 7% of the U.S. population yet 11% of the nation's unhoused population! The best way to prevent this is to hire a Veteran, who values skill, discipline and patriotism." He said in closing.

At this time Col. Hundley spoke to the full house of over 250 in attendance for the ceremony. "The majority of Veterans we honor today no longer serve actively by earring a uniform, but they continue to serve their communities in

this great nation. Many have gone on to become our public and private sector leaders: teachers, police officers, fire, community volunteers, and they are all our leaders. Whether they wear the military uniform today or wore it decades ago, Veterans represent an unwavering dedication and exemplify the highest ideals of service to our nation." He said. "Today, we honor the living Veterans who answered the call and served our nation - those in war, and in peace time. Since World War I, more that one mil-

> lion Veterans have been wounded while serving. Many continue to receive treatment for battlefield injuries and mental trauma suffered decades ago." Hundley added, "From Belleau Wood to the mountains of Afghanistan, and hundreds of places in between, our nation rose to greatness on the strength of their service, and their stories are woven into the fabric of the nation's history.

Following Hundley was U.S. Senator Cynthia Lummis. She spoke about her

We, the VA, recognize the important role of family caregivers in supporting the health and wellness of Veterans. Find out if you may be eligible and how to apply for the Program of Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers (PCAFC).

Family caregivers of eligible Veterans of all eras can now apply

As of October 1, 2022, this program is now open to family caregivers of eligible Veterans of all eras. This includes eligible Veterans who served after May 7, 1975, and before September 11, 2001.

Family caregivers of eligible Veterans of all eras can now apply.

Am I eligible for the Program of Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers?

You may be eligible if you and the Veteran you're caring for meet all of these requirements.

Eligibility requirements for the family caregiver

You must be at least 18 years old. And at least one of these must be true for you:

You're a spouse, son, daughter, parent, stepfamily member, or extended family member of the Veteran, or You live full time with the Veteran, or you're willing to live full time with the Veteran if we designate you as a family caregiver

Eligibility requirements for the Veteran

All of these must be true for the Veteran you're caring for: The Veteran has a VA disability rating (individual or combined) of 70% or higher, and; The Veteran was discharged from the U.S. military or has a date of medical discharge, and; The Veteran needs at least 6 months of continuous, in-person personal care services

What are personal care services?

These are services the eligible Veteran needs from another person. They include care or assistance to support the Veteran's:

Health and well-being; Everyday personal needs (like feeding, bathing, and dressing); Safety, protection, or instruction in their daily living environment; How many caregivers can the eligible Veteran appoint?

The Veteran can appoint:

1 Primary Family Caregiver (the main caregiver), and; Up to 2 Secondary Family Caregivers (people who serve as backup support to the primary caregiver when needed); ligible Primary and Secondary Family Caregivers can receive: Caregiver education and training; Mental health counseling; Travel, lodging, and financial assistance when traveling with the Veteran to receive care

Eligible Primary Family Caregivers may also receive:

A monthly stipend (payment); Access to health care benefits through the Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Department of Veterans Affairs (CHAMPVA)—if you don't already qualify for care or services under another health care plan; At least 30 days per

year of respite care for the Veteran *How do I apply for this program?*

Wyoming Veterans Commission

The Program of Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers

You and the Veteran will need to apply together and participate in an application process to determine if you're eligible for the Program of Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers. You'll both need to sign and date the application, and answer all questions for your role.

Note: Each time the Veteran wants to add a new family caregiver, the Veteran and the new caregiver will need to submit a new application. Remember, there can only be 1 Primary and up to 2 Secondary Family Caregivers designated at any one time.

The American Legion Veterans & Children Foundation feeds and houses children of military personnel and veterans facing urgent, unexpected hardships. It prevents eviction, keeps the power on and fulfills basic needs to hold a family together through difficult times.

The foundation also covers rigorous training and accreditation costs for American Legion claims experts who provide free representation for veterans and families applying for disability benefits, survivor assistance, GI Bill opportunities and more.

Since its inception in 1925 as the American Legion Endowment Fund, the foundation has assisted millions of veterans, their families and children in need. The fund was renamed American Legion Veterans & Children Foundation in 2019 to more clearly state who benefits from taxdeductible donations to the separate non-profit 501c3 element of the nation's largest veteran's organization.

The foundation relies entirely on charitable donations from individuals, like-minded associations and corporate allies.

At anyone time, more than 3,000 trained and accredited American Legion service officers are handling the needs of 750,000 or more U.S. military veterans who have become disabled through service to our nation, as well as their families, who may be caregivers, surviving spouses or dependent children.

The American Legion Tempo-

rary Financial Assistance program ensures that qualified military and veteran families with minor children at home can pay for food, shelter, clothing or other necessities when sudden, unexpected financial hardships strike. The program distributes between \$250,000 and \$1.2 million each year in one-time cash grants of up to \$1,500 each.

The American Legion, Department of Wyoming is obligated to donate \$11,000 to this foundation. At the present time, Wyoming has donated \$6500.00, but we are seeking assistance in donating the remaining balance.

When a department donates half the amount, an urn is placed on the desk of the NEC (National Executive Committee) room. Wyoming has already earned one of the urns.

National is requesting each post donate 25 cents per member over the next 7 years, which is around \$11,000.00. Wyoming would like to be able to earn that second urn; however, we would like to dedicate it to Past Department Commander and Detachment Adjutant Jerry Clark, who passed away on Tuesday. We would like to honor him for his years of commitment to the Legion and for all the hard work he has done, and so we are asking for donations now.

Dear Legionnaires,

I'm sure that everyone has been getting all the notifications about making sure that justice is served for those of you who were affected by the issues at Camp Lejeune! I just wanted everyone to know that National Headquarters has chosen a Law firm that will properly represent every veteran and not charge an enormous fee to benefit and take advantage of veterans. Here is an insert from an email that I received regarding this issue.

My name is Liz Hartman and I'm a spokesperson for Bergmann & Moore – The law firm that The American Legion has been under contract with since 2017.

I live in New Bern, North Carolina – a stone's throw distance from Marine Corps Air Station Cherry Point and Marine Corps Base Camp Lejeune. As a Marine Corps veteran, I am aware of the incessant advertisements that have been targeting veterans and their families in the wake of the passage of the PACT Act/Camp Lejeune Justice Act (CLJA).

Many of these firms are charging veterans and their family's exorbitant amounts – at times in excess of 60 percent, not including costs. Additionally, they have failed to notify potential clients of the offset provision in the CLJA leaving claimants with less money.

For these reasons and more, the Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation (VA&R) Commission announced at the 2022 Fall National Executive Committee (NEC) meeting that the contract with Bergmann & Moore be included to provide assistance with the CLJA. Bergmann & Moore has successfully represented more than 4,000 Legion veterans and their families in federal court before the

U.S. Court of Appeals for Veterans Claims and continue to actively serve as the Legion's training partner – leading Department Service Officer (DSO) schools. They presently represent more veterans before the Court of Appeals for Veteran Claims than any other law firm in the country.

The relationship with Bergmann & Moore ensures veterans and family members have CLJA representation that not only deeply understands the appeals process but has transparent/capped fees (33.33 percent inclusive of all costs).

To ensure veterans are educated on the complexities of the bill, I will be educating veterans on the complexities of the CLJA, answer any questions, and ultimately support them through their potential claims process.

I have asked Liz Hartman to attend our Department of Wyoming convention next year to share all the information they have about helping veterans navigate this process. I am encouraging everyone to attend the Department convention next year to learn about CLJA. I will also include any website information in future articles and emails to all the posts in the Department. Don't fall victim to the law firms that are preying on our veterans who are struggling with the side effects. If you would like to contact Liz Hartman her email is lhartman@vetlawyers. com. Oratorical Contest Since 1938, the contest has developed knowledge and appreciation for the U.S. Constitution among high school students.

High School Oratorical Scholarship Contest "A Constitutional Speech Contest"

The American Legion High School Oratorical Scholarship Program, "A Constitutional Speech Contest" is one of the most influential programs The American Legion has to offer. Through the work to prepare their presentations, contestants learn the responsibility side of the Constitution and how that responsibility plays out in the duties of citizenship. Students that involve themselves in the program are some of the finest youth there are in Wyoming.

The program, open to students grades 9-12, consists of two parts; The Prepared Oration and the Assigned Topics. The Prepared Oration consists of an 8-10 minute prepared speech on any part of the Constitution given without notes or script. The Assigned Topic delivery should be 3-5 minutes on the topic's relevance in today's news.

Assigned Topics for 2023 Oratorical Contest Amendment VI

In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the State and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and to have the Assistance of Counsel for his defense.

Amendment X

The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or *to the people*.

Amendment XIV, Section 1

All persons born or naturalized

in the United States and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the State wherein they reside. No State shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty or property, without due process of law; nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.

Amendment XVI

The Congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on incomes, from whatever source derived, without apportionment among the several States, and without regard to any census or enumeration.

Applicants do not need to be members and it is open to daughters, sons, grandson, granddaughters, as well as great-grandsons and great-granddaughters of veterans who served in Armed Forces during eligibility dates. Please let your schools and members know the various scholarships are available.

When submitting applications, please remind the participant to attach everything that is required. If a document is not complete or missing, it makes that application ineligible. For essays, it might be helpful to have someone else (teacher, parent, etc.) proofread the essay for grammar and spelling and don't forget to use the spell check and grammar check on the computer, along with the word count feature.

make their holidays more festive? What about doing some errands or provide babysitting so that parents can do some shopping? Or maybe wrap packages so the children don't realize that gifts have been gotten?

Ribbon cutting was held at the Veterans Home in Buffalo for the New Wyoming Skilled Nursing Home Building. They are planning on habitation after the first of the year. Governor Gordon was in attendance along with members of the Buffalo unit. They represented the Auxiliary wonderfully.

The PACT act has been passed into law. One of the major points is that those service folks that were in the area of the hazardous burns while deployed, will now have many medical

issues considered service connected. Flu shots and COVID shots/boosters are available for our veterans. Now is the time to talk those special veterans in our lives and have them use our VA's and clinics for their physical and mental needs.

Now for a total 180. Have you been keeping track of your volunteer hours and connected expenses? It is so much easier to do it at the least monthly so as not to forget anything. The hours kept are split into the categories following: 1) those volunteered and expenses at a VA or VA Clinic (VA also does this), 2) Veteran time for hours spent in your home or the veteran's home or a nursing home, etc., and 3) the new "Caregiver" title for the time, etc., spent providing care for the veteran within your personal family. "In Time Donations" are a guestimate for items donated and miles are a cost. Also note military families so we can count the hours spent on children. It is better to overestimate time and expense as we all underestimate what time we expend and how many dollars we spend. Please, please, please keep track no matter how nasty a chore it seems to be - Congress requires it.

You are a continued strong supporter of the veteran and active service personnel. You are very SPE-CIAL. Please keep up the good work.

SAVE THE DATE

At the 2022 National Convention a dues increase was passed on the floor beginning in the 2024 dues year. Senior dues will increase by \$6.00 but Junior dues will not increase at this time.

Units will not need to vote on this increase. With this increase the unit will send in \$31 for each member.

National will receive \$18.00 and Department will receive \$13.00. If your unit decides to increase their portion of the dues,

this will require a vote.

When these changes are made at the unit level, you will need to update your Constitution & By-Laws. Once any changes are made to a Constitution & By-Laws, a copy needs to be sent to the Constitution & By-Laws Chairman.




Veteran's Rock was opened in 2020, and has been successfully assisting Veterans in need. Whether it be clothes, food, furniture or household items, a bicycle or more, Veteran's Rock is there for the Veteran and their family.

"Our mission is Rock solid support for homeless Veterans, Veterans in need, and their families. We will be their foundation on which to build a new household and a new life." stated Cindy Stockdale, one of the board members.

Stockdale explained the need for aid for our Veterans. "With changes being made, and COVID-19 we needed to establish a help center for our Veterans." she said.

"We are strictly volunteer and are looking for anyone willing to donate time to help those who have served our country, and not just time in our center. We also need volunteers who can write grants, fix up the place, organize do- nations that have come in, and spend time with the Veterans and assist them getting items they need." Stockdale said.

Not only can the Veterans receive items for newly set housing, but they will receive items to live a healthy life and nourishment. "They can come in, have a beverage, sit in our meeting area and converse." Stockdale stated. "Part of what we do is not only pro- vide essential items for setting up their new housing, but we also provide guidance



to help them through tough times of being homeless, or just going through a tough time." she added.

Veterans Rock is located at 605 South Greeley Highway, in Cheyenne, Wyoming. Their hours of taking item donations is Monday through Friday 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

Items that can be donated for the center are: Washer and dryer, kitchen sink with cabinet, kitchen cabinets with drawers, two electric soup pots, large coffee pot, at least 32 cups, hot plates, folding tables 6' and 8', two small office desks, chairs, clothing racks, plastic storage bins, shelving, computers, all sorts of cleaning supplies - brooms, mops etc., coffee, sugar, coffee creamer, paper products - tissues, plates, bowls, napkins, plastic ware, cups.

Monetary funds are accepted for the monthly expenses, utili- ties, rent, phone, security cam- eras, office supplies etc. "While we are in our early stages, yes we are open, and Veterans may come in for assistance." Stock- dale confirmed.

Items accepted for Veterans are: clothing, small household furniture, coffee pots, crockpots, toasters, kitchen items - cups, bowls, pots and pans, everything you can imagine for helping a homeless Veteran set up home.

Non perishable snack foods, towelettes, gift cards for food, gas, car repairs etc. are also needed. The center has an area of items that are for sale to bring in more money for monthly expenses.

In the aid for Veterans, Veteran's Rock is putting on a Veterans' Stand Down. This event took place on October 25, 2022 at the "Forum 619" 619 S. Greeley Hwy., Cheyenne, WY, a couple of doors down from Veteran's Rock. The purpose of a stand down is to help Veterans and their families who are struggling, at risk of becoming homeless, or who are homeless.



There was lunch, haircuts and gear provided. Services and information available for the event are: Health Care, Housing, Employment, Vet Center Counselling, Education, Chaplain, Bike repair, Veterinary Assistance for Service Animals (please bring your pup with you!)

Unit 6 and Unit 60 both gathered items for the Stand Down and then both Posts assisted with the Stand Down serving Veterans and their families with goods they had gathered..

MARCH 2020 The covid virus came to Wyoming. The Cheyenne V.A. Medical Center was quarantined. The Community Living Center (CLC) was not allowed to have volunteers or family members. We were concerned that our veterans would become discouraged and depressed. We wondered what we could do to let them know they were not forgotten. We decided to send a card each week, but as the pandemic continued the postage would be quite costly. Why not encourage them to collect picture postcards from each of the states and Washington D.C.?

I got out our atlas and chose two places of interest (museums, National Monuments, parks or scenery) in each state. Betty Moore got on the internet and found telephone numbers and addresses of these places for me to contact. I chose two in case the first one said no I could have another contact to ask to contribute 24 postcards, assorted or all the same. Almost all of them said yes. I also found a few in magazines and t.v. that sounded interesting. Friends would bring back from states they travelled to. Martie Harbick brought cards back from 5 states!

After many months of searching and many phone calls and a few letters we reached our goal of all 50 states and D.C! Our own Senator John Barrasso sent 80 postcards that included 4 Washington Memorials! September 26, 2022 the project ending after sending postcards out once a week for 112 weeks. That's over two years. The reason we have so many extra postcards is that some states sent from 2 or 3 different places! We usually had 20-22 veterans, but for now only 18. This has left us with a surplus, so we are sharing them! Martie took 324 cards to Fall Workshop.




