Three of them went to the NEC and one had to be pulled because of language so the commission is working on that last resolution so it can be submitted to the spring meetings and one rejection. Here are the Resolutions submitted by the Veterans Employment & Education Commission. Resolution

number 13, the title of this resolution is Transition Assistance Program App. I am just going to give the answer to these resolutions. Therefore be it RE-SOLVED, By the National Executive Committee of The American Legion in regular meeting assembled in Indianapolis, Indiana, on October 11-12, 2023, That The American Legion urges Congress to direct all federal executive branch agencies involved in the Transition Assistance Program (TAP) to establish a private-public partnership to create a transition app with artificial intelligence component; and, be it finally Resolved, that the created app equip active-duty servicemembers and veterans with the necessary information on the resources and benefits available to them throughout the military life cycle.

Resolution #14. Title: Support the Armed Forces Retirement Home. RE-SOLVED, By the National Executive Committee of The American Legion in regular meeting assembled in Indianapolis, Indiana, on October 11-12, 2023, That The American Legion urges Congress to increase funding to The Armed Forces Retirement Home (AFRH) to ensure its existence and growth; and, be it finally Resolved, That The American Legion supports partnerships between the AFRH and other entities designed to benefit Veterans.

Resolution #15; Title: Military Hire Memorandum of Understanding. RE-SOLVED, By the National Executive Committee of The American Legion in regular meeting assembled in Indianapolis, Indiana, on October 11-12, 2023, The American Legion foster, through a memorandum of understanding (MOU) with Military Hire, a working relationship intended to increase awareness, resource utilization and veteran membership through collaborative cross- promotion for the benefit of transitioning service members and veterans.

Resolution #16, was rejected for the Expansion Of Joint Application Eligibility For Loans From The Department Of Veterans Affairs.

Resolution #25 is the resolution sent back to The Veterans Education & Employment Committee.

I am also sending Best Wishes For a Very Merry Christmas. Please do not forget to do your Buddy checks during this holiday season. These are very important because we have veterans out there that do not get anyone to visit with them. A visit to any veteran is like getting the best Christmas present in the world during our holiday times.



### 2nd Vice Commander's Corner

I open by saying that I hope that this finds you happy and healthy. As we enter the holiday season, I want to take this time to wish everyone a safe and blessed season of joy and family fellowship.

We are also very aware that we are entering into a political campaign season. The divide amongst the parties continues to deepen and with that the American public is being left to fend for itself. Back in 1919, when our American Legion organization was forming, we took

the stance of ensuring that our four pillars would be defended and fought for by this organization. Those pillars are Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation; Child Welfare; Americanism; and National Security. We continue to fight for these at our national level, but what about at the post level? How many of our posts participate in anything other than Burial Details? Don't get me wrong, those are highly important, and we do a great job of honoring our fallen. But what about the living? Do we get out and provide the community with information for voting or helping our elderly get to polling stations? Do we provide our halls for constructive debating? Do we help our local community with other events to help our children and families?

Our organization was feared by Congress when we were organized. Shouldn't we be that way again? One of the biggest mistakes our posts make is stating that we are apolitical and as such we can have no politics take part in our posts. This is not true. Apolitical is defined as "politically neutral; without political content or bias." This means that we need to provide an opportunity

for all sides to state their opinions and positions. The only time we would not allow a party to be associated with us, is if it is opposed to the United States Constitution or our form of government. We have a responsibility and duty to promote voting and ensure that our form of government is operating to the best of our abilities.

With all the national politics happening, I would like to remind everyone in the Department of Wyoming that our local and state politics are probably most important.

There are close to 51,000 veterans listed in Wyoming according to the last census taken. The American Legion currently only has a membership of 5,404 of these veterans. We have veteran owned businesses that need our support, not by purchasing their wares, but by fighting at the local and state level to ensure they have fair treatment with taxes and regulations. We have veterans who are struggling with property taxes because we are not pushing our local and state legislatures to honor their promises of fighting for the veteran. We have fellow veterans who are suffering mental

health crisis because of food insecurities and utility bills are outrageously priced. All these items need to be fought for by

Additionally, regarding buddy checks, many posts failed to perform their buddy checks during the National Veterans Affairs Buddy Check week which was held in October. Buddy Checks were started by The American Legion and were adopted by the VA this past year. Our organization can proudly state that it has once again led the VA into positive and productive programs. From the GI Bill, Veterans Home Loan programs, Agent Orange assistance, the PACT ACT, and numerous others, The American Legion has fought and succeeded in changing how our government fairly treats its veterans.

Thank you for your continued support and please reach out to at least one other veteran this season to ensure that we lose no others to suicide. BE THE ONE

### November News from Jackson Hole American Legion Post 43

Our Jackson Hole American Legion Post 43 has had a very busy fall. We have continued to hold our monthly meetings in-person and on Zoom, and our Post has continued to participate in our support of the veterans and members in Jackson and our surrounding communities. Our membership has grown to more than 140 members who joined or renewed for 2023. On October 28, Post 43 celebrated the 103rd anniversary of our charter. We are very proud of our Post building that was built 95 years ago, and it is a historic log structure in the center of Jackson.

Jackson Visit by American Legion National Commander: September 12-13, the new National Commander of the American Legion, Daniel Seehafer visited our Post with his Aide, the Wyoming Department Commander, and three other State Officers. Our Post held a breakfast "meet and greet" at the Post for the visitors on September 13 that was attended by a large number of Post members and also a group from "Honoring our Veterans." Following breakfast, the group moved to the Town Square to view our veteran's monument. The Commander also had the opportunity to meet our Post member, Fred Miles, who turned 106 on October 25, and who

is the oldest living member of the American Legion. One of Fred's assignments during WWII was to help train the famous Black Panthers, known as the Tuskegee Airmen.

Presentation by Dave Hill: Our





Post Adjutant, Dave Hill, gave us an interesting presentation on his background and experiences as an Army Officer and as a patent and trademark lawyer for over 40 years. He graduated from West Point in the class of 1969. He was commis-

sioned in the Army Corps of Engineers, went on to attend Airborne and Ranger Schools, and was assigned to an Engineer Battalion in Germany. He described his various assignments over the next 4.5 years in Germany, including serving as a Platoon Leader in a bridge company, a Company Commander of a Combat Engineer Company, and an Officer in the North Bavaria District Engineer Office. He also described some of his experiences as an attorney with a Washington, D.C. patent and trademark law firm that grew from 15 to over 400 attorneys during his 42 years with the firm.

Presentation by Joe Rice: At our September meeting, Post member Joe Rice, gave us a great presentation on his background and experiences as a Marine pilot, and his subsequent entry into the restaurant business in Jackson and Bozeman. After retiring from the Marines, he moved to Jackson and began his restaurant business career by purchasing the then very small Merry Piglets open air operation. Joe credits his

experience in the Marines for teaching him the values that he maintains in his business and in his family.

Presentation by Eric Cole: Our Post member, Eric Cole, who manages the National Elk Refuge, was the guest speaker at our October meeting. He described his background and experience in the Army, and his subsequent education focused specifically on the study of Elk. His comments on the day-to-day issues dealing with our large Elk population at the refuge were fascinating.





## "One - The Number to Remember" can you do this, you ask. are. We just need to be

Over the years, we've heard a lot of numbers in relation to the number of veterans who lose the internal battles they wage with themselves on a daily basis—14, 18, 22-24. At times, we are told that the number is getting lower, other times, that it is rising. Whether that number is 14, or 24, this year, the entire Legion Family is being asked to focus on the number 1. We are all being asked to "Be the One." What exactly does it mean to "Be the One?"

Be the one—to Save One. This is the very heart of the Be the One mission and the message is clear. Together, we can save lives, one person at a time. How can you do this, you ask. Our National President has broken it down into three steps: ALR.

A—Ask a veteran how he or she is doing. I don't have to think very hard to come up with a list of veteran friends to reach out to on a regular basis. It can be as simple as a quick text, a phone call or even an invitation to coffee. I challenge us all to make a list of at least 5 veterans that we commit to checking in on at least once a month.

L—Listen. Make sure that when you listen, he or she knows you are listening. The simple knowledge that someone cares enough to reach out and listen can go a long way.

R—Refer. If someone you know is in crisis, help that person get in touch with qualified mental health professionals. Offer to go to the first appointment. Be supportive and help that person get connected with qualified individuals.

We can all Be the One—it doesn't take a degree in counseling and we don't have to be mental health professionals, or even pretend that we

are. We just need to be there and to let the people we care about know that we care. And while the focus of "Be the One" is on our veterans, don't forget the spouses and other family members of our veterans. Sometimes they need a quick check in too. I know that when I receive a random text from a friend reaching out to check on me because he or she hasn't seen me in a while, that text can so often bring a smile and warm feelings after a particularly rough day. Perhaps Leo Buscaglia had it right when he said that "too often we underestimate the power of a touch, a smile, a kind word, a listening ear, an honest compliment, or the smallest act of caring, all of which have the potential to turn a life around." So my Legion family, I leave you with this challenge: pick 5 people to check in on at least once a month and Be the One to let those five people know that someone cares.

As always, in the spirit of service and not self.
