Last time, I talked about what to do in a crisis and the number to call. Well, what about the before and after? Generally speaking, most people don't wake up one day in crisis. It's been a lot of "stuff" just piling up until it becomes unbearable. Our buddy checks are a tool to use to help the before period so it doesn't get to that. But what do you do if the veteran has a need and you're not familiar with community resources? Maybe your not doing an "official" buddy check, just talking to someone you haven't seen in a while.

Here's a great little tool I've used in previous jobs and helping fellow veteranswww.findhelp.org

You just type in the zip code and it tells you how many programs are in the area and drop down tabs for all kinds of things like food, housing, Healthcare, transportation, legal, and many more.

Some people don't want to admit they need assistance and that's okay. If you are wanting a tool to help, this can give you things to talk about without being overly obvious. For instance, "I just found out that in Laramie, the Feeding Laramie Valley program gives fresh produce every week regardless of income and its local? With the way prices keep going up, this is a nice little way to save on your grocery bill. I got some amazing cucumbers and fresh dill that I made into Tzatziki Sauce for the Post last week".

Not overly obvious and you can put a little tidbit like that out to someone that might not ask for help otherwise. This is just a suggestion for those who have asked about ways to help but aren't sure where to go.

My thoughts and prayers are with you all as we go into the fall season. Thank you for your service, support, and dedication to The American Legion and Family and our notion's voterons.



Jackson Hole American Legion Post #43

It has been a busy summer so far for our Jackson Hole American Legion Post 43. Our monthly meetings have continued in-person and on Zoom, and our Post has continued to participate in our support of the veterans and members in Jackson and our surrounding communities. Our membership has grown to 138 members, and we also have 21 members of our SAL Squadron 43.

Oldest Living Member of American Legion, Post 43 member Fred Miles: After checking with several different sources, including the National Legion staff, we now believe that our Post member, Fred Miles, is the oldest living member of the American Legion in Wyoming and in the United States as a whole. Fred is 105 years old, he and will turn 106 in October. He retired from the Air Force in 1968 after nearly 28 years of service, including being a pilot in WWII with the Army Air Corps. One of his assignments was as an instructor for the famous Tuskegee Airmen. His many awards and decorations include the Distinguished Flying Cross, Bronze Star, and Air Medal with 5 Oak Leaf Clusters.

"Best of the West" and Memorial Day Activities: In May, our Post served as the lead unit in the Jackson Hole "Best of the West" Town Parade. Over Memorial Day weekend, Post members placed American Flags on the graves of veterans at the local cemeteries. On Memorial Day, we held the Jackson Annual Memorial Day Ceremony on the Town Square. After the ceremony, our team performed similar ceremonies at three local cemeteries, and at the Wilson Bridge, where two wreaths were dropped into the Snake River to honor those veterans lost at sea.

Presentation by Dick Scarlett: At our May monthly Post meeting, our longtime member, Dick Scarlett, gave us a great presentation on his background and experiences in the Army and as a banker in Denver and Jackson. He explained some of the important opportunities that lead him to eventually purchase the Jackson Bank when it was in serious financial trouble, and how he oversaw the growth and success of the bank until it was ultimately sold to Wells Fargo.

Presentation by Rick Black: During our June meeting, Post member Rick Black, gave us a wonderful talk on his background and experiences in the Air Force, and as a leader in several companies after his military service. Rick served in Korea in 1954-55, and he also spent 6 years in the Air Force Reserve were granted U.S. Citizenship.

after his active duty ended. Rick then described his very successful career as a top leader and manager of several successful businesses.

Report on the Wyoming State American Legion Convention: Also at our June meeting, Post Adjutant, Dave Hill, reviewed some of the highlights of his trip to the State Convention in Lusk, Wyoming. Dave offered for our Post 43 to consider hosting the 2026 Convention, assuming we can establish a Post Auxiliary Unit and our Post approves. Our Post received several awards at the convention, including the Heavy Mallet for having the highest percentage of renewed and new members in our Division (104.65%) by May 17.

Presentation by Dave Larson: At our July Post meeting, Dave Larson, who has been a Post member for 26 years, gave us a great presentation on his background and experiences as an Army Officer in Vietnam, and as a lawyer, including over 20 years as the Jackson Town Attorney. Following Dave's presentation, he received a surprise gift of a Quilt from the Quilts of Valor Foundation and a Certificate honoring his military ser-

Honor and Color Guard Activities: Our Post provided an Honor Guard for funerals at the Aspen Hill Cemetery on May 22 and August 5. On June 9, our Post presented each of the 190 graduating seniors at the Jackson Hole High School with an American Flag and a copy of the U.S. Constitution. The Wyoming State Legion Baseball Tournament took place in Jackson from July 24-28. Our Post supported the Jackson Post 43 Giants team with color guards for games, provided a monetary donation to assist with the tournament, and a Post member donated use of her home to house umpires for the Tournament. We also provided a Color Guard for the Naturalization Ceremony on August 4 at the Grand Teton Visitors Center, where 31 immigrants



"A Constitutional Speech Contest"

The Oratorical Program is a multi level progressive contest whereby high school students learn and demonstrate

The American Legion High School Oratorical Scholarship

knowledge of the United States Constitution and the responsibilities of citizenship that it contains as they reach for a share of the over \$203,500 in scholarship awards.

Each contest consists of a prepared oration, on any part of the United States Constitution, 8 to 10 minutes in length, and the Assigned Topic portion, three to five minutes in length.

The Assigned Topics for the 2024 Oratorical Contest:

Amendment II - A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be in-

Amendment XXIII - The District constituting the seat of Government of the United States shall appoint in such manner as the Congress may direct:

A number of electors of President and Vice President equal to the whole num-

ber of Senators and Representatives in Congress to which the District would be entitled if it were a State, but in no event more than the least populous State; they shall be in addition to those appointed by the State, but they shall be considered, for the purposes of the election of President and Vice President, to be electors appointed by a State; and they shall meet in the District and perform such duties as provided by the twelfth article of amendment.

Amendment XXV, Section 3 - Whenever the President transmits to the President pro tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives his written declaration that he is unable to discharge the powers and duties of his office, and until he transmits to them a written declaration to the contrary, such powers and duties shall be discharged by the Vice President as Acting President.

Amendment V - No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a grand jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the militia, when in actual service in time of war or public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offense to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, not be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use, without just compensation.

July 4th, 2023





Thank you all! The Beatitudes and the **Cowboy Code**



port? Each Unit compiles the individual hours and submits an Impact Report at the end of the reporting period. That information is compiled into a District Report and then a Department Report. The Department Report is then sent to National and National submits the information to Congress. This information allows the ALA to obtain grants and recognition to help broaden our resources to assist veterans, military and their families.

According to the National ALA website, for 2021-2022 ALA members volunteer 3,265,977 hours serving veterans and military, and 359,273 assisting veteran and military families. Resources raised for veterans and military was \$11,007,709 and \$1,350,722 for veteran and military families. This is only part of the picture. If you don't report your hours, your numbers won't be counted. Just think of the impact ALA members actually make supporting veterans, military and their families.

Do you need a pin for your hour bars. You can order one from American Legion Flag and Emblem. The item number is 315.909. The pin runs about \$15 plus shipping and handling. Hour bars are given out during Department Convention each year (at no charge).

Greetings fellow Auxiliary members! There were two changes made to the American Legion Auxiliary Deartments of Wyoming governing documents at the Department convention in June. One of these changes was made to the Standing Rules, and one to the By-Laws.

*The changes are as follows:*By-Laws Article III, Duties of Offic-

Section 7. Alternate National Execu-

"Constitution & Bylaws

tive Committeeperson

- 1. It shall be the duty of the Alternate National Executive Committeeperson when called upon to assist the National Executive Committeeperson and, in their absence, perform their duties.
- 2. The current Department President will serve as the alternate National Executive Committeeperson. (Effective July 1, 2023)
- 3. Alternate National Executive Committeeperson shall succeed the National Executive Committeeperson in case of death, resignation or removal.

Standing Rules Article IV, C. District Funds

 The District receives a per capita assessment from each Unit based on the previous year's senior membership. Units will be billed by the Department Office.

Any balance left after the District Conference expenses have been paid may be used at the discretion of the District. If there is still a balance at the conclusion of the District Conference, those funds will become part of the Department General Fund. If significant, the District should consider voting to lower the Unit Assessment to lessen the burden on the Units

- 2. No District funds may be used to purchase personal gifts.
- 3. District membership challenges cannot be taken from the District assessment money.
- 4. No travel expense shall be allowed for any Department Officer or Chairman attending a Spring Conference other than the Department President.
- 5. The assessment funds are meant to defray the District Conference expenses, including pay for District awards, pay for the Department President's lunch, pay for the District President's pin, and cover the District Conference postage expense.

Also, \$25 will be sent to the Department President to help defray lodging costs for the District Conference.

6. The District President is responsible for two financial statements; one for ex-



pense reimbursement up to \$250 and one recording income and expenses for the District Conference from the Unit assessments. Both must be submitted to the Department Executive Secretary-Treasurer by June 1st along with a copy of the District Conference minutes. A copy of the District Conference minutes should also be placed in the District notebook

There were no changes made to the Constitution. The most current version of all of these documents are available for download on the Department Website. Should you need to have a copy provided to you, please contact me and I will see to it that one is available for you at the Fall Conference.


