First and Last Day of Class: This is a Jump Start short course Alternate Block. The first day of class is Sunday, June 9, and the last day of class is Saturday, June 15, 2024.

Course Description: Students in this course focus on practical experiences in government while learning values associated with citizenship. This is an experiential learning course for participants of Wyoming Boys and Girls State, who are taught US and State government processes and procedures. Course Competencies:

Upon completion of this course, successful students will be able to:

- Define basic terms and concepts related to government, citizenship, and democracy;
- Discuss the governmental process; and
- Explain the importance of citizenship in a democratic society

Attendance and Course Drop Policy: Attendance in a face-to-face course is defined as physically attending a class where there is an opportunity for direct interaction between the instructor and student. The last date of attendance for all students in face-to-face, online, or hybrid courses is documented by the last on-time submission of work or physical attendance in class.

Students who do not complete the application process by the American Legion and American Legion Auxiliary timeline, as seen on their websites, will be dropped for non-attendance.

Drop for Non-Attendance: To avoid being dropped from this class for non-attendance, students must participate in the class by either attending physically or virtually or by submitting an assignment by June 15, 2024.

Grading:

All grades in POLS 1009 are Pass/Fail. Final course grades will be based on the following:

- Active participation as a citizen of Girls State.
- Voting in all Girls State elections.
- Maintaining the high ethical standards expected at Boys and Girls State.
- One (1) written communication describing the Wyoming political/governmental process with a specific focus on how citizens can participate in the process and influence policy
- at least one (1) oral communication focused on citizenship involvement in elections and other ways for citizens to influence the actions of government
- One (1) essay of personal reflection on the motivation to become involved in American Citizenship. Include how you as a citizen will participate and become involved in influencing others and the government's actions. The essay will be emailed to <u>wyoming_gs@yahoo.com</u> no later than July 15, 2024.
- Completion of an academic assessment to measure knowledge of government processes

Course Academic Integrity:

Incomplete Grades: The LCCC Catalog identifies the conditions under which a grade of "I" can be assigned.
